# Growing Up with the wexford

**MY NAME IS JEREMY BARKER** and I have the pleasure of helping to put together the Communicator for The Wexford. My first memories of the home began long before this experience however, dating way back to the mid-1980's when I was merely a boy at George Peck Public School on Warden Ave. Through



various school activities – folk dancing, the school choir or the occasional talent show – we got to perform fairly frequently for the seniors at The Wexford. It was always fun, but admittedly I always wondered why anyone would want to be entertained by a group of 6 year olds, and furthermore why our audience was always so supportive and kind, with big smiles and cheerful enthusiasm no matter how bad we were!

The years went by as they tend to do. For 5 years, I would walk by the home every day on my way to Wexford Collegiate, and would stand at the intersection at Pharmacy and Lawrence and exchange smiles and perhaps a "hello" with a number of residents out for a stroll. A few I would almost come to expect, same time, same place, always friendly and always genuine.

Shortly after I finished University, my grandfather, Norman Barker, was fortunate enough to get a room at The Wexford. On the surface, he didn't come across the way all the jovial seniors did back when I was 6. He was certainly on the quiet side and preferred a game of Bridge to one of the many forms of physical activities on offer to him. Initially, I think my family was worried that he was a bit out of place but then something happened – Grampa started to make friends, and attend events, and do stuff that put a smile on his face. His claims of boredom quickly turned to a friend he had made, a joke he had heard or maybe something special he had in common with another resident. Even one of the tougher nuts to crack, my grandfather, was able to find peace within at The Wexford.

When he passed on in 2012, we decided as a family to have a small service for him at the place he called home for 6 years. The mood, obviously somber given the circumstances was lifted when I got the chance to speak with some of my grandfather's caregivers and friends – good stories, maybe something funny he said, and even a few things I had never known about him were shared with our family.

When I was 6, when I was 14, when I was 25, I always noticed the overwhelming kindness from every resident I conversed with. I always wondered why? That was until I had my own family live at The Wexford and hearing stories of the community within – the activities, the friends, and the fabulous staff. Helping with the Communicator has given me the chance to read more stories like what my grandfather always spoke of and with each one I read, I think of him. And I'm happy knowing that he got to experience all of these great things when he needed it most.

**LET US EXPLAIN:** Here at The Wexford, on our 5th and 6th floors we have a need for 5 Fixed Ceiling Lifts and Slings per floor. We will need high quality equipment that can lift up to 450 lbs. and serve the majority of our residents' needs. Our research shows that the best equipment for us to purchase would be the Waverly Glen C-450 model at a cost of approximately \$5,000 each which includes installation.

However, we don't have a source for funding these Lifts and Slings and because the need is great, we decided to go directly to our donors and past supporters and ask for your generosity through our annual Christmas Campaign this year. The safe lifting of residents in long-term care facilities is always a challenge especially as the residents age. The majority of residents on the Wexford's 5th and 6th floors are in wheelchairs and require lifting and heavier care. Introducing Lifts and Slings on each floor would greatly improve the quality of life for these seniors. While there are Lifts and Slings on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Wexford, the residents on the 5th and 6th floors have none.
