


THE PAN AM GAMES are over and we can be proud of our Canadian athletes' performance winning a record breaking 217 medals! Next on the calendar is the Para Pan Am Games which are now underway.

Summer is finally here and life at The Wexford is proceeding as planned, with a variety of activities and outings including BBqs, summer socials, outings to the mall and restaurants. It is great to see residents and families enjoying the outdoors and our gazebo!

This is the season for relaxation and much needed vacations, and I encourage everyone to take advantage of our relatively short summer. I know that I will! I will be away on vacation the last week of July and the first week of September.

We have been busy working on our quality initiatives that we identified in our QIP or Quality Improvement Plan, a copy of which is published on our website. We are working to reduce the number of residents with a physical restraint, such as a lapbelt, as best practice guidelines support discontinuing their use. The evidence from research

In addition, we are adding a third quality improvement initiative to our QIP, namely reducing the number of residents who are on antipsychotic medication, but do not have a diagnosis of psychosis. This has been covered in the media a lot these past few months and it is a government priority. So like all other nursing homes, we will be reviewing all these residents and discussing with families our plan for reducing the dosage or discontinuing the drugs altogether and then monitoring the effect on their behaviour. We started this initiative in April and we have seen very positive results. Thanks

to all the families/POAs who supported us in this very important project.

Our capital projects for this year are underway as well. We have begun the process of replacing our emergency generator which is expected to be completed by December 31st of this year. Installation of our new security cameras is being completed this month and then we will begin the installation of the elevator lock-outs that I have reported on in earlier editions of The Communicator. These are our three capital projects for this year.

We are also completing two smaller projects. Our hairdressing salon received a make-over thanks to the generosity of our hairdresser, Juliet, who arranged for new hair styling stations to be donated and the volunteers who cost-shared the cost of the renovation with us.

In addition, the tenants are costsharing the renovations to the coffee kiosk area on the main floor. In August, you will see an enlarged kiosk area, as

this will now encompass the coffee kiosk in the morning, the tea room in the afternoon (will move from the mezzanine) and the gift shop throughout the day. The current gift shop will close and a selection of their most popular items will be on sale from a lockable cabinet in the kiosk area. These changes came about as a request/ suggestion from the volunteers who man these three areas. It is getting more difficult to find volunteers to keep all these services open, so by combining them, we are able to keep them all open 7 days/week, from 9 am - 3 pm, for the enjoyment of residents, tenants and their families and friends. It is wonderful to see the volunteers and tenants contributing to the cost of these projects and this truly reflects the strong partnerships that we enjoy with these two groups!

On another note, the MOHLTC sent all 'C' homes a long-term care redevelopment survey which had to be completed and returned by May 7, 2015. The Wexford Board of Directors completed the survey as requested and indicated that we do plan to redevelop over the next 10 years. As a 'C' facility, we and 308 other long-term care homes, do not meet the current design standards and so have until 2025 to redevelop. The Wexford is land locked as are all the other Toronto 'C' homes which means that we will likely have to look for a new site outside the City of Toronto, as the cost of land in Toronto is prohibitive for a charitable, non-profit organization such as ours. The MOHLTC does provide about 80% of the cost of construction, with the home expected to fundraise the other 20% and cover the cost of the land. As you can imagine, redevelopment is complex and

time-consuming. In addition to the 166 residents in long-term care, I also have to consider my 90 tenants, as they are an important part of life at The Wexford. However, the MOHLTC is only concerned with the long-term care side of the house. The MOHLTC has started to produce a newsletter related to their redevelopment strategy. NEW PROCEDURE FOR RESIDENT'S Casual Leave of Absence/or Day Outing

ON AUGUST 1ST 2015, the Nursing Department implemented a new procedure for residents leaving the Home with families/friends/visitors on a casual leave of absence or a short outing. The purpose of this new procedure is to help keep track of residents leaving the Home for a short while for reasons of their safety and better care monitoring.

Family members/friends/visitors who are taking the resident out will be required to sign the resident out and sign back in on the Leave of Absence/Outing binder

located at each of the nursing stations. Please note — the sign in and sign out sheet at the Ground floor reception will still need to be signed off by all families, visitors, volunteers and contractors to the Home as part of the Home's standard /infection control, fire and safety procedure.
